#### Visitors discover new amenities at Bridalveil Fall and visitor center

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Before they see Half Dome, Yosemite Falls, giant sequoias or other jaw-dropping attractions, the first stop for millions of visitors as they enter Yosemite National Park is Bridalveil Fall.

new Welcome Center were funded by federal dollars, and matched with \$12.2 million in private donations from the Yosemite Conservancy, a San Franciscobased nonprofit group that for years has helped improve the park's features.

"Yosemite is a world-class destination," said Frank Dean, president of the conservancy, and a former Yosemite ranger. "But it gets a lot of visitation, so things can tend to get worn down. You want to make a good first impression and do it well. The park just needs some TLC sometimes.'

At Bridalveil Fall, construction crews expanded the parking lot by 24 spaces to hold 80 cars. The infamous compost toilets with four stalls were torn down

# **Big Tesla** job cuts planned in **Bay Area**

2,700-plus layoffs, many at electric car plant in Fremont, are expected to start June 14

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FREMONT » Tesla is slashing more than 2,700 Bay Area jobs, including major layoffs at the company's electric vehicle factory in Fremont.

The staffing reductions at the Austin-based electric car maker - which has its engineering headquarters in Palo Alto — represent the largest single round of job cuts by a tech company since the tech sector began its current series of Bay Area layoffs in 2022.

The cuts come as Tesla is mired in a slump that is affecting electric vehicle makers worldwide. They also hit as CEO Elon Musk, one of the richest men in the world, faces increasing scrutiny for his controversial and provocative views on U.S. election integrity, White supremacy and more.

"The electric vehicle adoption rate globally is under pressure," Musk said during a recent earnings call with Wall Street analysts regarding Tesla's first-quarter financial results. "A lot of other auto manufacturers are pulling back on electric vehicles and pursuing plug-in hybrids instead."

Tesla will chop a total of 2,753 jobs in the Bay Area, according to official WARN notices the company sent to the state Employment Development Department. An estimated 1,452 of the layoffs are slated to occur at an address that corresponds to the site of the Fremont vehicle factory, one of the WARN letters shows. Layoffs are also planned at multiple other locations in Fremont and Palo Alto, the filings with the state indicate.

None of the layoffs affected unionized workers, according to the WARN notices. The job cuts were all described by Tesla as permanent.

The company didn't respond to a request for comment about the situation.

### **Newsom: Circumvent Arizona abortion ban**

doctors could give their patients abortions in California under a proposal announced Wednesday by Gov. Gavin Newsom to circumvent a ban on nearly all abortions in that state.

It would apply only to doctors licensed in good standing in Arizona and their patients, and last only through the end of November. Arizona's 1864 law banning nearly all abortions except if the mother's life is in jeopardy takes effect June 8. Newsom said protecting access to abortions is "just about basic decency" and "respect for women and Wednesday, after two failed

"This Arizona law is the

first border-state law that will directly impact the state of California," the Democratic governor said. "Rather than just acknowledging that fate and future, we're trying to get ahead of this law."

Newsom joined the California Legislative Women's Caucus and advocates to announce the proposal. Lawmakers called the Arizona law "draconian" and said California had an obligation to get involved. The bill would need to pass by a two-thirds vote in each house of the Legislature before reaching Newsom's desk. After he signs it, it would go into effect immediately.

### Hearing examines driver's mental state

Father whose car plunged off cliff with family might enter psychiatric program

REDWOOD CITY » A Pasadena radi-
